

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Black History Soror Audra Fields-Chisolm



Alpha Chapter's African American/Multicultural Committee presented a Black History program titled **Women of Color:**

Virtually Strong at the February 13, 2021 meeting. The program began with the song, Everything Must Change by Randy Crawford followed by greetings and welcome by the committee chair, Soror Audra Fields-Chisolm. The Black Nation Anthem, Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing set the stage for "Hey Queen" a virtual motivational presentation by several famous women of color.

Xinos Kayla Brown-Robinson, a freshmen at County Prep, Jersey City and a first year Xinos did an exceptional presentation of the poem, "Dear Black Girl" followed by Kudos Elijah Chisolm, a junior at Inion Catholic Regional High in Scotch Plains, who did an outstanding performance of "You Are So Beautiful." Committee members each provided a prerecorded presentation of a woman of color who has made noted contributions to society and their presentation of "Hey Soror" which has been shown on Face Book.



Henrietta Lacks— an American woman whose cancer cells are the source of the HeLa cell line, the first immortalized human cell line that reproduces indefinitely under specific conditions. Her cancer cells were taken from her body without her knowledge and have been used to advance cancer research, HPV, AIDS, and space physiology.



Mellody Hobson- an American businesswoman who is the chairwoman of Starbucks Corporation. She was the president and co-CEO of Ariel Investments. She is the former chairwoman of DreamWorks Animation, having stepped down after negotiating the acquisition of DreamWorks Animation SKG, Inc., by NBCUniversal in August, 2016.



Shirley Anita St. Hill Chisholm was the first African American woman in Congress (1968) and the first woman and African American to seek the nomination for president of the United States from one of the two major political parties.



Nikki Giovanni-One of the world's most well-known African-American poets whose work includes poetry anthologies, poetry recordings, and nonfiction essays, and covers topics ranging from race and social issues to children's literature.



Gwendolyn Ifill- American journalist, television newscaster, and author who became the first African-American woman to host a nationally televised U.S. public affairs program with Washington Week in Review- a political analyst and moderated the 2004 and 2008 vice-presidential debates.



Misty Danielle Copeland - an American ballet dancer for the American Ballet Theatre (ABT) one of the three leading classical ballet companies in the United States. On June 30, 2015, Copeland became the first African American woman to be promoted to principal dancer in ABT's 75-year history.



Stacey Yvonne Abrams—an American politician, lawyer, voting rights activist, and author who served in the Georgia House of Representatives, serving as minority leader. A member of the Democratic Party, Abrams founded Fair Fight Action, an organization to address voter suppression, in 2018. Her efforts have been widely credited with boosting voter turnout in Georgia, including in the 2020 presidential election, where Joe Biden won the state, and in Georgia's 2020–21 U.S. Senate election and special election, which gave Democrats control over the Senate. In 2021, Abrams was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize.



Dr. Gladys B. West - an American mathematician known for her contributions to the mathematical modeling of the shape of the Earth, and her work on the development of the satellite geodesy models that were eventually incorporated into the Global Positioning System (GPS).

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"Search Your Heart" Sorors Frances Harold & Mildred English



Soror Frances Harold, chair of Health, Hypertension and Nutrition Committee and Soror Mildred English presented information on Heart Health at the February meeting.

Soror Harold spoke of the many activities that take place in February; Black History Month, Dental Month, Cherry Month, Val-

entine's Day, the Super Bowl and the beginning of Lent which leads to Easter. She emphasized another important occurrence in February which is Heart Health. We were informed that the American Heart Association tells us to Search our Heart and in doing so, each soror should take action by creating a list of four obtainable lifestyle changes they wish to achieve in 2021.

- 1. Walk 30 minutes most days.
- Make an appointment with the physician for a check-up. If one is on Medicare, sign up for the free yearly wellness check-up.
- 3. Get to know numbers: weight, B.M.I. (Body Mass Index), cholesterol, blood pressure and diabetics-A1C.
- 4. Plan heart healthy meals for the week.

Everyone needs to make a commitment to help reduce the risk of disability and death from heart disease and stroke.

Some Supplements to possibly help reduce the risk of COVID 19 included Vitamin D—daily, 2000 to 4000 IUS, Vitamin C–500 to 100 mg Zinc—30 to 50 mg.



Soror English told sorors to do the following: Keep Your Numbers in Check: Get Physical! No time to exercise? That's OK. Don't think exercise-think action. Increase physical activity to at least 30 minutes daily, even if it is done in 10 minute intervals.

- 1. Use the stairs, up and down instead of the elevator.
- 2. Sweep the floor, wash windows or vacuum the carpet briskly.
- 3. Take the children to the park and play with them.
- 4. Take a walk after dinner instead of watching TV.
- Park a few blocks from the office or store and walk the remainder of the way.
- 6. Take an activity break. Get up, stretch and walk around.
- 7. Hide the remote and get up to change the TV channel.
- 8. Need more motivation? Call the American heart Association at 1(800) AHA USA1 to obtain information about free women's programs.

How to Love Your Heart:

1. Celebrate with a checkup. 2. Get off the couch. 3. Quit smoking in four steps. 4. Drop a pound or two. 5. Become a salt/sodium detective.

Fourteen Alpha Chapter sorors attended the NSPDK, Incorporated, Eastern Region Executive Board Planning Meeting on Friday and Saturday, February 19-20 virtually. Approximately 236 sorors were in attendance.

The meeting was chaired by the Eastern Regional Director, Dr. Patsy O. Squire and began with the Ritualistic Opening Friday evening. During the welcome and introduction by Alpha Soror Anona Huntley, Member-At- Large, Alpha Chapter's video which included the Sorority Hymn was shown along with the "Hey Soror" video. The Regional Director's opening message centered around using what we have to reach our goals, even during a pandemic. Her message was followed by the "Work What YOU Got" Video.
