As we know, October is Breast Cancer Month. Some of the risk factors to know are the following: being female, getting older, family history, dense breast, being overweight, drinking alcohol. Be sure to schedule your annual mammogram and check your breasts regularly.



Nutrition Tip for the Month: "An Apple a day will keep the doctor away." Apples are a good source of dietary fiber. They contain vitamins B6, B12, C, K, magnesium, potassium, and manganese. The organic compounds present in apples are of real value. The health benefits of apples include prevention of stomach disorders, improved digestion, liver disorders, dental health, gallstones, constipation, diabetes, heart disease, skin diseases, anemia, cancer, gout, and eye disorders. Moreover, they also help to prevent the initiation of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease. Apples are low in calories and contain no saturated fats or cholesterol. This fruit is rich in dietary fiber, which helps prevent absorption of bad cholesterol in the gut.

The fall of the year is the time to plan trips to the orchards or farmers' markets to discover new local varieties of apples. Some favorite brands include Cortland, Golden Delicious, Red Delicious, Granny Smith, and Honey Crisp.





ing as there are active cases of Human Trafficking in the state of New Jersey.

This topic is of importance because we are an organization of educators who work with youth in our careers and within our organization. Alpha Chapter partnered with Fair Girls to deliver a session that defined Human Trafficking, shared the description of commonly used terms, highnightened the signs of individuals who may be at risk or in danger of being trafficked for sex or labor. Fair Girls works to help provide long-term therapeutic interventions, including safe housing, for exploited and trafficked young women and girls.

National Diabetes Month Soror Frances Harold



November is National Diabetes Month, a time when communities across the country team up to bring attention to diabetes. **Diabetes Awareness Day** Is November 14, 2021.

This year's focus is on **pre-diabetes** and preventing diabetes. **Prediabetes** is a serious health condition where blood sugar levels are higher than normal, but

not high enough yet to be diagnosed as type 2 diabetes. Several sorors of Alpha Chapter attended a Zoom workshop sponsored by the Union County Chapter of the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Club on Monday evening, November 15. The title of the workshop was **Diabetes: Don't Sugar Coat It!!!** The presenter, Dr. Akia Blandon, Nurse Practitioner, provided a wealth of information on factors that cause diabetes, symptoms of diabetes and ways to decrease the risks of having diabetes.

Diabetes is a chronic (long-lasting) health condition that affects how the body turns food into energy. Most of the food eaten is broken down into sugar (also called glucose) and released into your bloodstream. When your blood sugar goes up, it signals your pancreas to release insulin.

There are two types of diabetes. Type 1 diabetes is thought to be caused by an autoimmune reaction (the body attacks itself by mistake) that stops the body from making insulin. With type 2 diabetes, the body doesn't use insulin well and can't keep blood sugar at normal levels. About 90-95% of people with diabetes have type 2. It develops over many years and is usually diagnosed in adults. Symptoms may not be noticed so it's important to have blood sugar tested. This test uses a drop of blood to check the A1C. The blood sugar may be high which is called hyperglycemia or low, hypoglycemia.

If you have diabetes, your body either doesn't make enough insulin or can't use the insulin it makes as well as it should, or when there isn't enough insulin or cells stop responding to insulin, causing too much blood sugar stays in your bloodstream. Over time, that can cause serious health

problems, such as heart disease, vision loss and kidney disease. There isn't a cure yet for diabetes. Some healthful hints to control Type 2 diabetes include the following:

- 1. Take control of the diet. We have power over what we eat. Put a little less on the plate. Eat until you are no longer hungry. It's ok to leave food on the plate. Eat healthy food. Each meal should have 30-45 carbohydrates. Nutrition can change the outcome.
- 2. Drink at least eight glasses of water a day.
- 3. Being active can really help. Exercise at least 30 minutes a day (4-5 days a week) Try Walking or doing chair exercises.
- 4. Get diabetes self-management education and support, and keeping health care appointments can also reduce the impact of diabetes on your life.
- 5. Taking weight down impacts diabetes.
- 6. If you have diagnosed with prediabetes, you need to carry a snack when going out.

Alpha Chapter's Health, Nutrition and Hypertension Committee chairperson presented Rules for a Longer Life at the November meeting. They are consistent with the hints above: 1. Get regular medical checkups. 2. Let food be thy medicine. 3. Eat more plants. 4. Avoid processed foods. 5. Drink more water. 6. Get moving. Walking counts. 7. Eat dinner meals early. 8. Constantly work on quitting bad habits. 9. Make sleep your super power.

Teacher-to-Teacher Soror Jawharah Muhammad

I saw this post in a group for Black educators:



We have meetings during our planning period (Team meetings, data meetings, PLC's, IEP's/504's etc.) So, I'm doing a lot of work at home. (Lesson plans, inputting grades, etc.) Does anyone ho advice for getting work done during school hours or how I cannot let work consume my evenings and weekends?



I used to be this way, and I am sure many educators can say the same! Reading this gave me flashbacks to my first TEN years of teaching, and it made me realize that I am now a... gasp... "veteran teacher"! As a veteran teacher, I feel it is now my duty to use my classroom experiences (both failures AND) successes) to provide advice to others, just as my amazing mentors provided for me. If you find even one small part of this article useful, please share it with your teacher-tribe! 10 Tips to Better Manage Your Teacher Time and STOP Taking So Much Work Home

- 1. Don't grade EVERYTHING. Sometimes, completion is enough and scoring isn't necessary.
- 2. Come in early to do work if you can. The mornings are very quiet because most of the staff hasn't arrived. The ones who have, are usually there to work. (If they aren't, see tip #4.)
- 3. Designate "presentation and explanation" days when students have to present and/or explain their work (in person or play their recorded videos from sites like Flipgrid). This live review allows you to grade on the spot and it allows students to reflect on their own and their peers' work. This has become a game changer for me when grading projects.
- 4. Isolate/Seclude yourself!! I have actually locked my classroom door during my early mornings and prep times because people will develop a habit of interrupting you and throwing you off your schedule. Socialize less at work.
- 5. Pick one or two days a week to stay late. Usually one hour after school allows me to catch up. I love to choose Fridays for this because I don't have to come right back the next day. (In the first month of school, I tend to stay later due to massive amounts of beginning of the year paperwork.)
- 6. Utilize automatic grading sites and resources. Google Forms, Quizizz, and Nearpod are just a few resources that you can use. Remember... your curriculum may also have tons of auto-graded assignments since data-driven instruction has become more commonly expected. Don't discard all of those valuable tools you acquired during remote teaching and learning!

- 7. Lesson plans: Reuse some of your previous year's lesson plans if you can!! The wheel doesn't always need to be reinvented. When I am planning with my co-teacher(s), I now type directly into my lesson plans instead of just making notes on paper. I just started this in 2021 (yes, I know I might be late to this party) and it has been a total game changer.
- 8. Utilize self-checking assignments more. I love the "Faceing Math" activities because you can tell whether the work is correct just by looking at the picture they create. I also love coded message assignments. You can find these on sites like TeachersPay-Teachers.com
- 9. Employ students as "teacher assistants". I utilize trustworthy students (who are not easily influenced by popularity and opinions) to go around the room to check for students' homework completion. They carry a clipboard with students' names and record daily. This allows me to perform other classroom tasks simultaneously. Once they are finished, it is quick to look at the clipboard to see who did and didn't complete their homework and update my gradebook.
- 10. Use test days to catch up. But also utilize some websites like EdPuzzle or Khan Academy to provide virtual instruction for easier concepts. Students love youtube and they are very comfortable with learning many things from videos (tiktok dances, etc.) so easier concepts or review of prerequisite concepts can be done with well chosen instructional videos. While they are watching, you can be working... but don't forget to circulate! We know how our scholars can easily stray when in front of an electronic device.

Note: While I utilize these tips I am giving, please know that I, too, still struggle with working from home more than I would like. However, I work from home MUCH LESS than I did 10 years ago, thanks to these actionable steps I have been taking. An attorney friend of mine, who sometimes works in her office until midnight once told me that the difference between a career and a job is that a career's tasks may have to come home with you at times, but a job's tasks never will. Embrace the career you have chosen, but don't let it take over your personal life!

Native American Heritage

Native American Heritage Month is celebrated in November. The chairperson of the African American/Multi Cultural Committee provided information on the Native Americans of New Jersey at the November meeting. In doing so, we discovered that Alpha Chapter Soror Frances Harold is a blood member of the Nanticoke Nation of the Lenni-Lenape of New Jersey; both of her parents were members. The Original People (Lenni-Lenape) inhabited New Jersey long before the Europeans arrived. They were a people with a strong sense of tradition and a well organized life-style.

Soror Harold provided additional information about the Nanticoke Nation to which she belongs. The tribal chairman, Mark "Quiet Hawk" Gould is a high school classmate and has been the Tribal Chair for more than 40 years. The tribal family is divided into the Elders, the Citizens, and New Dawn (teens), and the Little Acorns.

The Tribal Ground is located in Fairfield Township, New Jersey. The Tribal Center where meetings are held and the Trading Post are located there. At Spring gatherings in May the naming ceremony takes place. Traditionally, one was not named at birth. They were gifted a name at an appropriate age based off of elements specific to the that person. Soror Harold's aunt's name was "Sunflower."

During the month of June the pow-wow takes place at the Salem County Fair Grounds. There are arts, crafts, dancing, drumming, story telling and guest speakers.

Soror Harold mentioned that the members of the Tribal dancers have performed at the Museum of the Arts in Newark, New Jersey and have had exhibits there, also. She spoke of her Uncle Oliver Greene who made a teepee that he himself utilized and traveled to schools in the area to give talks about the Nanticoke Nation. Their tribal symbol which is the turtle.
